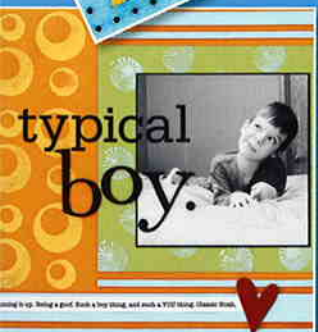

For the ultimate small-space garden, try a wall of plants. The Vertical Garden by sculptor Joost Bakker is a modular system of pot-plant support frames. The geometric design is made up of welded steel rods, available as columns up to three metres tall. The steel rods come in raw, galvanised and powder-coated black. They're priced from \$485 plus delivery for a raw-steel two-metre-tall module. This set-up costs about \$4000. And your vertical garden doesn't have to be against a wall; it can look great flanking a doorway or at the corners of a balcony. It's also suitable for indoor use.
